To conduct sanctioned matches and specialty shows under the rules and regulations of the American Kennel Club.



Dog's Emotional Cup

Every dog has a cup that needs to be filled-with social connection, security, access to reinforcers, and enrichment.

Some dogs seem to have a full cup most of the time, either because of a genetic pre-disposition, or because they have learned good ways to get a refill.

Most things that dogs do are completely normal-including the annoying stuff, like DIGGING up the garden, CHASING cats, or BARKING at the mailman. But all dogs show signs of stress when their cups get near empty.



Signs your dog may be coping with an empty cup

What refills a dog's cup:



- ▼ Doing Dog Things: SNIFFING, CHEWING, FORAGING, BARKING, DIGGING, PLAYING
- ▼ Being included in the family (dogs/humans)
- ▼ Freedom to move
- ▼ Freedom to make choices
- ▼ Ability to control outcomes and get reinforcers
- ♥ Unconditional love and attention
- ♥ Good health: nourishing food, no parasites, etc.
- ♥ Having a safe, quiet place to rest
- ▼ Predictable routines and interactions
- ▼ Getting to do things a dog loves to do


What empties a dog's cup:



- ♦ Social isolation
- ♦ Long periods of confinement with no enrichment
- Poor nutrition, untreated illness, or pain
- ♦ Denied access to reinforcers
- Scarv or unpredictable reactions from important humans
- Over-stimulation (over-exercised) or not enough
- Set up to fail, and then punished for it
- No preparation for challenging situations
- ♦ Unclear training: not knowing how to get reinforcement
- No one responding when expressing a need
- Too much "impulse control" (i.e. no sniffing, no eating, no exploring, no barking, no doing Dog Things) for too much of the day



Benadryl for Snake Bites

This article was written by a veterinarian of the United Waterfowlers Forum.

"First, let me say that I have been a vet for 23 years in N Florida. We treat probably an average of 15 snake bites a year. That would translate to over 300 snake bite cases I have treated, or been involved in. So my opinions are not based on what happened to one dog, or my neighbor's dog or even the 2 dogs that have been bitten that I personally owned. So not only have I treated a lot, but since I do treat so many, I stay current with current treatment options and what works best (based on data, not stories).

So, here goes with some absolutes about snakes. The things that follow are facts that I have either observed or read or both.

- -There is no magic time for how long until treatment. get them there as soon as you safely can. I have saved dogs that were bitten 24 hours prior and had patients die that I saw within 30 minutes. The exception is if there is a bite to the tongue or inside of mouth that may cause breathing issues. I have never seen a bite to the nose cause life threatening breathing issues.
- -You do not need to make any effort whatsoever to "get the snake" to take it to the vet. If it is poisonous and causes swelling, we know what to do. The only other poisonous snake in FL is the coral and it does not cause swelling. Unless it is some released species and we will not have antivenin anyway.
- -Antivenin (antivenom) is NOT an antidote (meaning it cures). I rarely give it anymore. There are situations where I think it is best to give it, but I have found very little prediction of survival based on antivenin administration. There are some cases that are so bad, you had better use everything you have (bites to the trunk (body) of small dogs or cats).
- -Benadryl (Diphenhydramine) is NEVER wrong to give and almost always, if not always, will help the patient. The liquid is nearly as fast as an injection. 1mg per pound of body weight (or Children's Liquid, generic is fine 1 tsp for every 12.5 pounds of body weight if they are bitten).
- -Treatment by a veterinarian will ALWAYS result in less disease for the patient. Absolutely, many patients will survive without veterinary treatment. But snake venom is a huge protein and huge proteins are deposited on the basement membrane of the kidneys when filtered. This leads to immune related injury to the kidneys from snake bites that may not be clinically relevant, but could lead to permanent kidney damage that could affect them later in life. Intravenous fluids reduces this risk as well as keeps the patient well hydrated to get rid of the venom and reduce the toxins built up from necrotic (dead) tissue resulting from snake bites. Simply put, if you want to increase the dogs chances of survival and less long term disease, take them to the vet.
- -Moccasins are the least toxic, copperheads next (we have tons of them around here) and rattlesnakes are the worst. Moccasins may have more tissue toxicity-damage local tissue and pain-but they are the least toxic of the snakes. But they can still kill a dog.

A lot of factors play a role in the odds for the dog:

- *Location of bite-nose, face, head, legs, trunk of body (best to worst)
- *time of year-fall snakes have been actively feeding and have less stored venom, spring snakes have more likelihood of having stored venom from less recent feeding
- *amount of injection a miss or an oblique bite that does not get full injection
- *species of snake
- *size of snake (more venom = more serious)
- *prior history of bites improves patients odds (more immune response to the venom)
- -Anyone, vet or otherwise, can NOT predict which dog will live and which will survive by looking at them, or even by running tests. there are just so many variables. I can often tell someone that the odds are bad or that the odds are good, but sometimes I am wrong. I still get surprised.
- IV fluids are the single most important factor that we can control in helping a snake bite victim recover with the minimal amount of disease, with Benadryl being second. Some patients are going to die, no matter if they were in a veterinary University Teaching Hospital at the time of the bite and there is NOTHING that could have been done to save them. I have had patients die with 30 minutes of the bite (one was a Jack Russel bit in the side of the chest, the other was an American Bulldog bit between 5-10 times all over the body). If you ask me, "What can I do to make the odds the best in my dog's favor that it will not die from a snake bite?", I would say:
- --keep Benadryl in your dog first aid kit Children's Liquid, generic is fine. Give them 1 tsp for every 12.5 pounds of body weight if they are bitten.
- --DO get your dog to a vet if they are bitten as soon as reasonably possible do not be over-dramatic and get in a car accident to get there, but do not stop at the dry cleaners on the way either. Proceed with due haste."

To make these frozen dog treats you'll need:

1 banana

32 oz. plain yogurt, Greek or regular, unsweetened

(I used Greek yogurt so the mixture was thicker and the mini dog biscuit would stand up as a handle)

2 heaping tablespoons of *peanut butter

*make sure your peanut butter does not contain Xylitol, a natural sugar alcohol sweetener which is harmful to dogs

You can vary these ingredients~ add an additional banana, more peanut butter, pumpkin puree, or leftover cooked oatmeal. Just make sure your yogurt does not contain artificial sweeteners (harmful to dogs) or added sugars.

Place all your ingredients in the blender or food processor and puree them.

Place in your containers and allow them to freeze solid.

When ready to serve, pop them out of your trays or peel the paper off your cups. The dog biscuit makes a convenient and tasty handle to pull the frozen treats out of the trays.






The Versatility Greater Swiss (VGS) title is awarded to dogs whose achievements have been recognized with at least four (4) conformation, obedience, and performance event certifications.

Dogs receiving the VGS title must have completed at least an AKC conformation Championship (CH), and AKC Companion Dog (CD) title, and two (2) other titles from two (2) of the other performance category.

Versatility Greater Swiss Excellent (VGSX) for those dogs who have already achieved a VGS and go on to advanced titles in obedience and working/performance areas.

Tummy Balls of Goodness

Are you looking for a gluten free and nutritious way to add a punch of goodness to your dog's diet? You can make these easy little sweet potato and spinach balls to add to 1 cup of kibble. Add a punch with your favorite essential oil for digestive health.

What you need: 2 sweet potatoes (peeled and cubed) and 1 cup spinach (chopped).
Essential oils based on needs: Spearmint or Lavender, 1-2 drops for cooling, and Ginger or Digize 1-2 drops for warming.

To make: Steam the cubes of potatoes in about 2 tbsps of water in the microwave for about 10 minutes until soft. Mash them with a fork and allow to cool. Then add spinach and your essential oils.

You can roll them into small balls that are an approapriate size for your pet. Simply serve 3-4 of these over about 1 cup of their kibble as an added bonus. This is not intented to replace their current diet. You can store the left overs in the fridge for 2-3 days.

Dog days of Summer!

Summer can bring a lot of challenges for taking care of our pets. We want to take them with us, but we worry about heat, insects, pests and more. What can we do to insure they enjoy the season as much as we do?

Did you know that skin problems are one of the top reasons owners bring their pets to the vet? The skin is an organ and is often the only outward reflection of a problem on the inside. With a holistic approach, the entire body may be restored to optimal health, which is then reflected in the condition of the hair and skin.

In the summer, allergies may worsen in our pets. Sometimes fleas or environmental/contact allergies may be the cause. Many pets are sensitive to flea salvia, as well as types of pollen, grass and weeds.

Diet can, however, be a contributing problem for many skin conditions in pets, just like humans. You might see a lackluster, brittle or coarse coat, dandruff and red, bumpy, scaly or oily skin which all can be signs of problems that go more than skin deep. Toxins can build up in your pet's system — either from excessive western medications or a poor quality diet.

Last year, there was an FDA alert about the increased use of grain-free diets in pets. Was it being overused and putting the pets at risk? Just like other things, not every diet is a perfect fit for your dog. However, according to Cornell University of Veterinary Medicine, grain is one of the most common causes of food hypersensitivity. A grain-free diet is therefore

an excellent first step in combating skin conditions in your pet.

Some pets are sensitive to ingredients other than grain, such as certain

meats, vegetables, fruits or eggs. These are less common.
Although a lamb and rice diet is often recommended for dogs with skin issues, lamb can actually worsen a 'hot' itchy dog according to prinicples of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM). Lamb has a warming property

and is more 'yang' in intensity, instead of cooling 'yin' or neutral foods.
Cooling choices might include white fish, turkey, duck or beef. Seek out your local holistic vet to discuss the best diet choice for your animal.

The best bet to combat itchy skin from the inside is to use a natural, minimal processed diet that is free of added chemical preservatives and fillers. Under the direction of your vet, you may be able to start reducing the use of steriods and antibiotics, which are the most common traditional treatment method. These methods may weaken the immune system and cause more dryness, which may worsen the problem. The good news is that there are many pet foods on the market now to help you find the right choice.

Simple Chicken Coop Cleaner

Supplies:

- 1. 16 ounce glass spray bottle
- 2. 1 cup white vinegar
- 3. 1/2 capful of Thieves Household Cleaner (THC)
- 4. 16 drops of lemon EO
- 5. Distilled water
- 6. Label for bottle
- 7. Funnel is needed

Instructions:

- 1. Add vinegar and THC to bottle.
- 2. Add lemon oil.

- 4. Be sure to label your cleaner.

Tips:

- 1. Be sure to always wear gloves when you are cleaning chicken or bird coops for your safety.

What you will need:


- 1. 1 pound goats milk soap base
- 2. 2 TBSP organic coconut oil
- 3. 2 TBSP shea butter
- 4. 1/4 cup crushed oatmeal
- 5, 15-20 drops Cedarwood EO
- 6. 10-15 drops Lemongrass EO
- 7. 10-15 drops Lavender EO
- 8. 7-10 drops Roman Chamomile EO
- 9. Spray bottle of rubbing alcohol
- 10. Silicone mold

Instructions:

- 1. In a microwave safe bowl, melt the soap base in 30 second intervals, or over double boiler, until melted. Repeat with shea butter and coconut oil. Then combine melted ingredients.
- 2. Allow to cool for 1 minute. Add essential oils. Use fewer essential oils for small dogs and more for larger dogs.
- 3. Add oatmeal and mix together. (I add a dust of oatmeal to molds.)
- 4. Pour in and allow to cool.
- 5. Store in sealed bag or jar.

DIGIZE: Is your pet's stomach upset?
There are several ways to tell, but eating grass may not be one of them despite the wise tale. Did you know that only about

25% of dogs vomit after eating grass?
Many times puppies will chew on grass while they are teething, dog's and cats may eat grass by instinct. It may simply be the actual

But here are a few other things you may notice, that are not as obvious as vomiting and diarrhea:


- 1. Lip smacking 2. Drooling
 - 3. Gulping
- 4. Licking surfaces
- 5. Loss of appetite
 6. Burping
- 7. Stomach noises
 - 8. Passing gas
 - 9. Restlessness
- 10. Decreased Activity

When I notice this, my first response is to rub a drop or two of diluted Digize over the tummy. If behavior does not improve, seek the attention of your vet to investigate further!

TRIM THOSE NAILS!

Trim your dog's nails, and then next week, trim your dog's nails, and then, the week after that, do it again. They live their life on those feet, so it's your job as a responsible owner to keep their feet healthy and comfortable. Every groom shop I've ever known will trim nails for a very reasonable price. I say groomer, because they tend to take the time to work with the dog, rather than pile on and do a quick, wham-bam job, and the dog learns to accept it, rather than fear it. Embrace Wellness (and probably others) will also reimburse you for nail trims. You pay for the insurance, so get your money's worth while avoiding health problems and unnecessary pain.

When do they need done? Every 1 to 2 weeks from birth on. Our puppies' nails are clipped at a few days old, and by 8 weeks old have been clipped and dremeled more than a handful of times. Most breeders do the same, so you likely have a puppy who is used to it the day you take them home, so keep up on it.

If you're not sure why it's important, walk around on your heels for a few days and see how your body feels. It doesn't take much for them to be walking with bent toes, either twisted sidewise or up at an unnatural position. Walk the dog on a hard surface. Can you hear the clicking? Trim their nails. Can't hear it? Good! Trim them anyway.

What tool should you use? I much prefer a rotary tool (ie dremel), but my Chicago Electric brand tool has been the most reliable and cost about \$20 at Harbor Freight 6-ish years ago. My cordless tool was \$18 at Walmart and has a light, which is amazing, but I like a corded tool for longer nails. Batteries dying with one foot left is frustrating. I use sanding bands, rather than stones, because they stay cooler. You can splurge and buy the diamond tip, but bands work just fine.

Omg, but what if they bleed! Unless your dog has a serious medical issue, they'll stop bleeding. Might look like a crime scene before it stops, but your dog won't die. Cornstarch, styptic powder, a romp in the dirt, and the blood will stop. It's pretty difficult to "quick" a dog with a dremel, and pretty easy to quick them with clippers.

How do you teach the dog to accept it, and even *gasp* enjoy it? There's a million answers for that. Ask your breeder, ask your groomer, ask your vet, ask other Swissy owners, watch **YouTube** videos, grab a foot and learn as you go, join the Nail Maintenance Facebook page. Whatever route, just do it. Your dog and future dogs will appreciate the effort.

There are very, very few good reasons to leave nails long, including weight pull and sledding, but chances are, 99% of the dogs on this page aren't doing those things, and don't need the length, and they're a health hazard. Keep them short, keep them in a routine, and you will have a much happier, healthier dog. Also, don't let them get fat, but that's a rant for another day...



Foul order coming from the mouth, ears or skin Abnormal whining or crying






